I also found community here through helping with Vacation Bible Camp and Rise and Shine Breakfast as well as participating in Lenten Studies, Movie Nights, and Book Club -all begun and lead by our ministers, Rev. Lorraine and Rev. Andy.

I have been the UCW representative on the AUC Council since before the fire. I know the tireless work that has been done by the EDGE Property Committee, the Trustees, and the Council. Many challenges have been worked through and surmounted.

This photo was taken on the day of the fire. It shows the sun shining through an upstairs window of the church façade, the only part left as the fire was going out. It has always been a symbol of hope for me- a sign that God was with us, and we would rebuild. We would rise again from the ashes. The picture was on one of our bulletins a few weeks later. I cut it out and it has been hanging on the bulletin board in my office for the last ten years.

I felt the same feeling of hope as I watched the north steeple being dropped and welded into place a few weeks ago.

Unfortunately, the insurance funds we counted on to build our new church will not stretch as far as we had hoped because of increased construction costs. That's why we're running our "Rising from the Ashes" fund raising campaign. David and I chose to make our donation on April 11th, the ten-year anniversary of the fire. I did an e-transfer, putting "Rising from the Ashes" and my PAR number in the memo box. It was quick and easy.
